GENERAL MANAGER TO RETIRE



Tom Rudloff has announced his plans to retire this year. His last day of full time responsibilities will be Friday,

May 12. The Board of Directors are currently working with National Rural Electric Cooperative Association's Executive Search to secure a replacement.

Tom wanted to be an electrician when he started his schooling - obtaining his Diploma in

Electrical, Residential, and Commercial Wiring from Northeast Community College. He simultaneously served in the Army National Guard where he obtained the rank of Staff Sergeant. He learned a lot about leadership and serving during this time. He has a deep respect for veterans and those currently serving their nation in the armed forces.

After 10 years of working as an electri-

cian for Creighton Electric, he was hired on at North Central Public Power District (NCPPD) to do load control and there, took advantage of the Merchant's program, and logging hours as a lineman for the Department of Labor Apprentice program to become a journeyman lineman.

He was with NCPPD for 20 years holding the positions of Lineman, Line Crew Chief, General Foreman, Supervisor of Engineering Services and Purchasing and Operations Manger.

During this time, he earned his BS in Business Administration and MBA from Wayne State Col-

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safely each day and to serve the customers.

Elkhorn's mission to provide safe, reliable, cost-effective electricity to all customers has been his guide.

He is proud to say that there were no fatalities on his watch, but it was the number one thing that would keep him up at night.

He has helped employees develop skills and take more control of their safety, with option analysis and having decisions made at the work site. Several programs Tom committed to like, Speak Up Listen Up, Commitment to Zero, and partnership with a physical therapist, have helped to decrease incidents and injuries. Elkhorn is currently over 900 days with no lost time injuries.

Serving our excellent customers, working with awesome employees and working with the board of directors has been rewarding.

There have been several circumstances when it made sense and the board decided to work "outside of the box" and continued adding services and building infrastructure when other districts were restricting or even halting these activities.

Tom leaves Elkhorn with better reliability and in a good financial position - holding rates steady for 10 years and rate decreases for last year and this year.

He has enjoyed all the challenges that come with being in the electric utility industry. First, as a lineman, helping to get the power back on after a

storm, to figuring out ways to serve the customers better as a general manager.

He has also enjoyed and appreciated building relationships and working with others in the public power network, as well as customers, vendors and legislators.

He is looking forward to spending time with family, traveling, hunting, fishing and just enjoying a very blessed life.
