

YELC TO WASHINGTON D.C.

Each year ERPPD sponsors high school students to attend Youth Energy Leadership Camp (YELC) in Halsey, NE.

From there students have the opportunity to attend Youth Tour in Washington D.C. through the Nebraska Rural Electric Association (NREA).

With these experiences, one camper has fulfilled a dream and made a career for herself.

In 2011, ERPPD sponsored Ivy Prater of Elgin to attend YELC. At YELC she was selected by her peers to be an ambassador for the annual NREA Youth Tour.

The following summer, she went to Washington D. C. on the Youth Tour and was then selected as



one of 44 on the Youth Leadership Council for the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA). (You can read about that in the July 2012 *Wire* at erppd.com)

Youth Tour gave Ivy her first taste of life outside of Nebraska.

Ivy remembers, “We met with Hill staffers who told us how you don’t have to be a political science major [to work in Congress or D.C. in general]. You could major in public relations...or anything you are passionate about. That’s when I realized that could be me if I worked hard and set my mind to it. I decided I really

wanted to come back out here and give it a shot.”

She was hired for two summer internships with the NRECA while she attended the University of Nebraska at Kearney.

Ivy is now employed as a coalition and grassroots associate in the public affairs department at the NRECA, in Washington D.C.

Recently, Ivy was the recipient of the Judy Schneider Fellowship (pictured below)- a year long program sponsored by Women in Government Relations.

SAFETY NEWS

Spring is coming and home improvements will abound. Please use the following safety tips when utilizing an extension ladder.

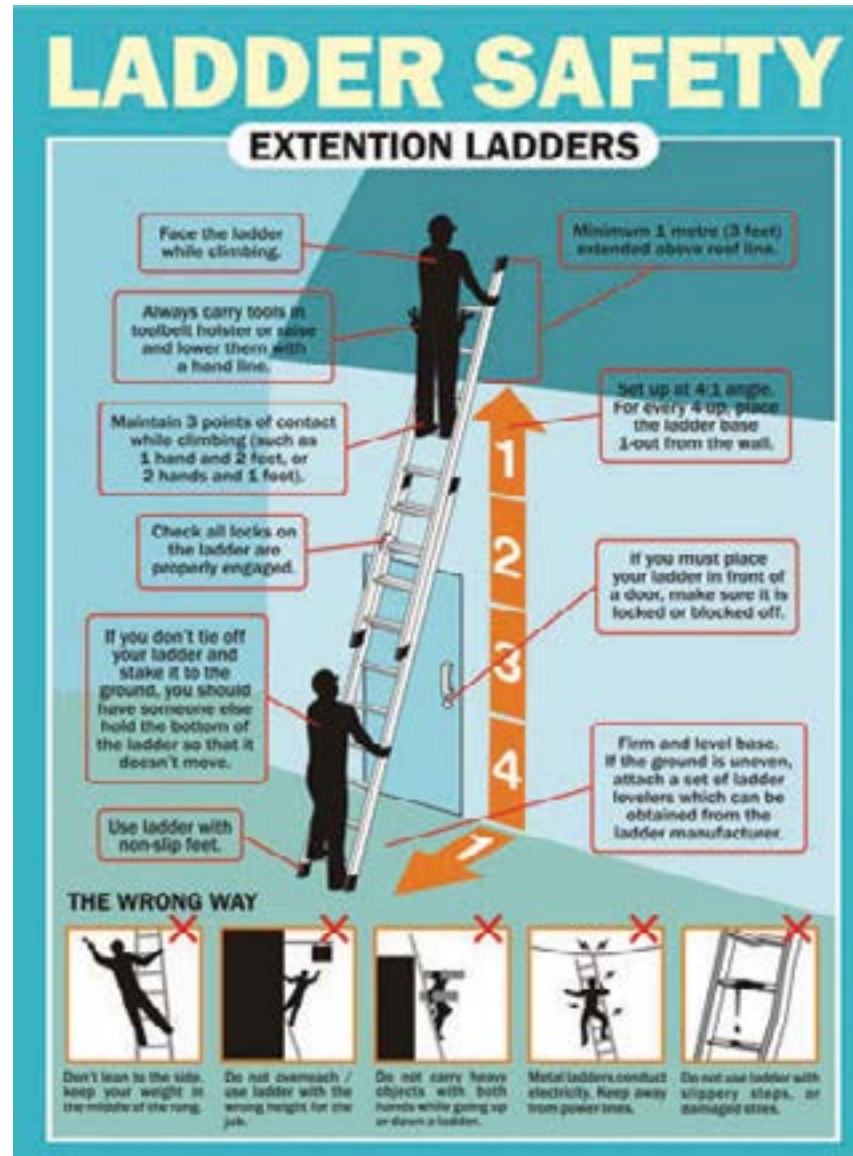
Do:

- *Ensure the ladder is placed on a firm, level surface. Then, erect the ladder so that the upper section rests on the bottom section. This will make the bottom section face the supporting structure.
- *Set the ladder up at a 4:1 angle. (See graphic to the right)
- *Erect the ladder so that it extends at least 3 feet beyond the landing platform.
- *Anchor the ladder or have someone hold the bottom for stability

Don't:

- *Set up or take down a ladder when it is extended.
- *Use near power lines.
- *Overextend the ladder
- *Stand on the top rung
- *Overreach/use the ladder that is not appropriate for the job
- *Use on icy, snowy or slippery surfaces.

Ladders are great tools to get the job done. Follow the "steps" to extension ladder safety and enjoy a project well done!

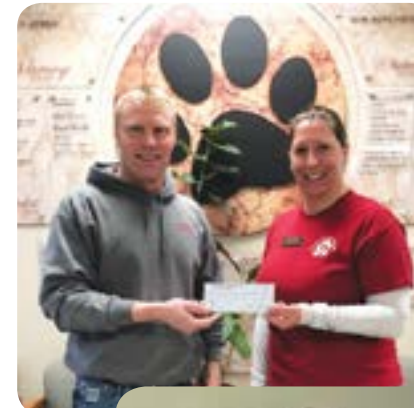


YOUR "CHANGE" PUT TO WORK
